Community Priorities | Scorecard Feedback

Three community priorities emerged from the MARKYT Community scorecard for the Harvey area. These priorities, with a general summary of concerns outlined in Scorecard feedback, are:

Housing

- Allow further rural subdivision to free up land for housing
- Develop affordable housing options such as tiny homes, more caravan parks
- Advocacy for social housing, emergency accommodation

Aged care and accommodation

- Develop appropriate downsizing options suitable for an aging community, similar to Brunswick River Cottages
- Increased affordable aged accommodation

Playgrounds, parks, reserves

- Barbecues, toilets and more seating at local parks
- Dog walking areas
- Sandpit cleaning



Community Priorities | Workshop Feedback

Two FUTYR Workshops were held in Harvey on May 14, 2025. A total of 59 people from Harvey and surrounds attended the workshop. The FUTYR workshops helped us to understand and support the priorities emerging from the scorecard. Over the course of the workshops, we received many written suggestions and comments.

Workshop participants also reviewed approximately 154 actions proposed for inclusion in the Council Plan. These were grouped under the banner of nine themes and 23 objectives, as shown on the next page.

The 148 actions were developed from a variety of sources, including MARKYT Scorecard feedback and actions carried over from existing plans and strategies.

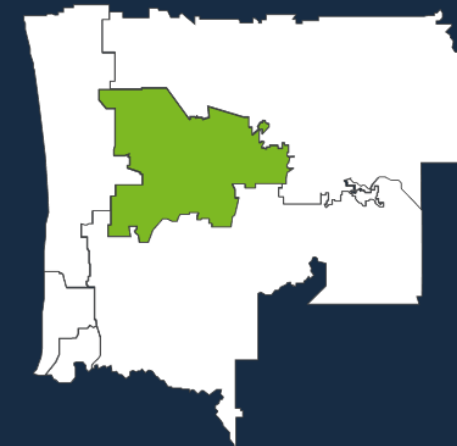
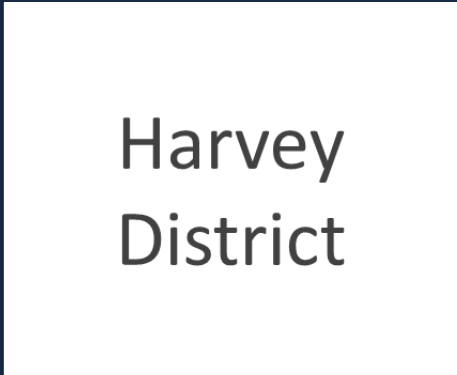
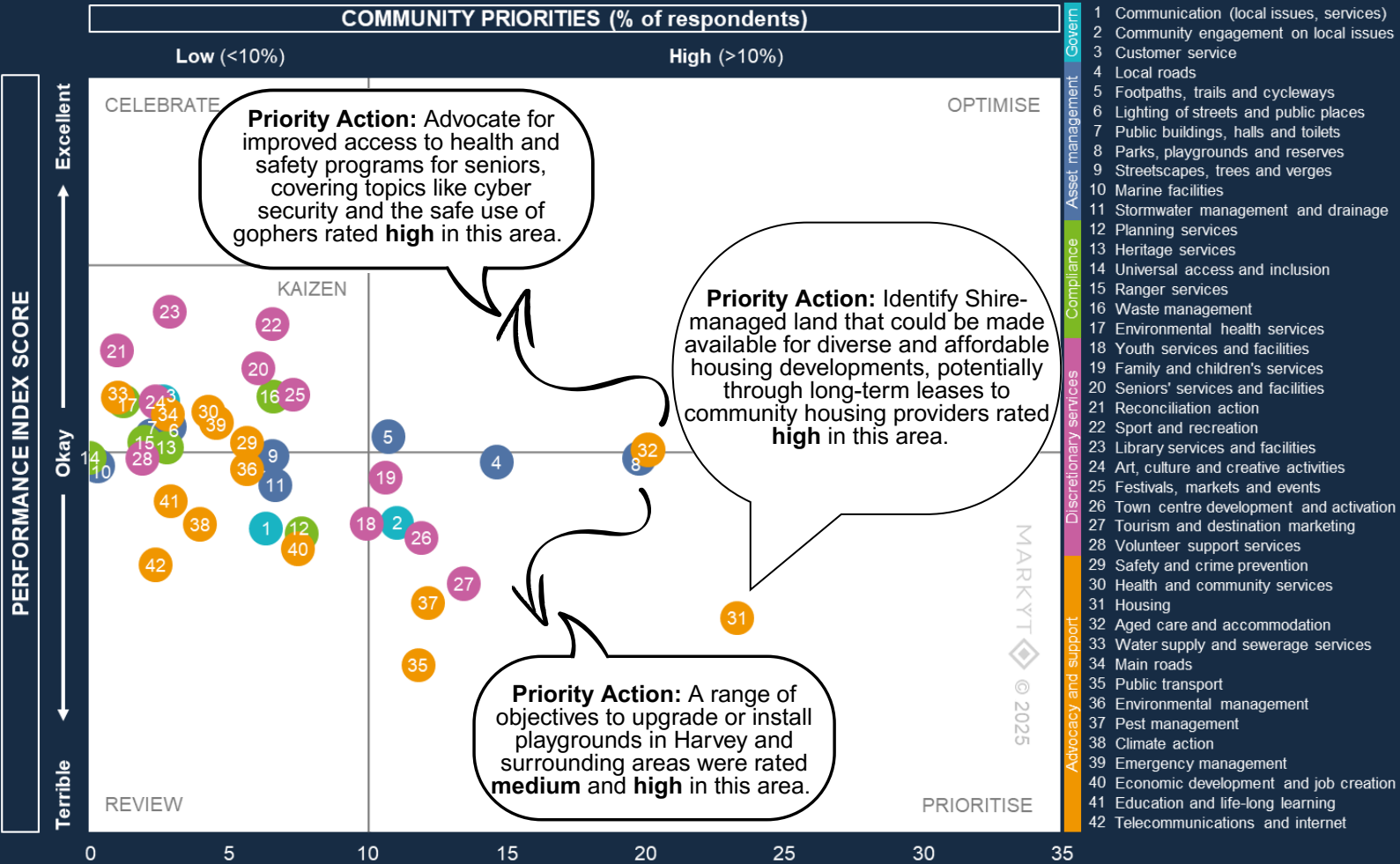
The workshops gave participants an opportunity to provide feedback on topics across the whole Shire. They also allowed us to understand what was important to each community. The pages below provide a general overview of the responses and priorities that emerged at the Harvey workshop.
