Advisory Groups are a key component of the aspirations set out in the Shire's Community Engagement Policy. They bring key stakeholders together to advise the Shire on strategies and policies, and on communities need within the Shire of Harvey.


The below Terms of Reference consists of General Terms that apply to all groups and Specific Terms for each Advisory Group.

General Terms for all Advisory Groups:

- Advisory groups are not formal Committees of Council created under s5.8 of the *Local Government Act 1995*.
- Advisory Groups have no delegated authority to make decisions on behalf of Council.
- Advisory group meetings will be held four times per year or as often as necessary to perform the objectives of the group.
- The Council will appoint Councillor members to the Advisory Groups.
- Shire Officers will determine other members in accordance with the specific terms for each Advisory Group.
- Councillor members of advisory groups are to represent the policy position and strategic views of Council, when participating as a member appointed by the Council.
- The Chairperson of each Advisory Group will be nominated by the members of the Advisory Group at the first meeting and can be either a Councillor or a community representative.
- The Deputy Chairperson of each Advisory Group may be either a Councillor or a community representative.
- The quorum for the Advisory Group will be one more than 50% of the membership.
- Strategic and policy recommendations of an Advisory Group will be reported to Council for decision.
- Management and operational recommendations of an Advisory Group will be reported to the CEO for decision.
- The Shire of Harvey will provide an appropriate venue for Advisory Group meetings.



• That representative membership to all Advisory Groups, with the exception of the Sport and Recreation Advisory Group, be a maximum of 15 members.



Specific Terms:

Heritage Advisory Group

Role of the Group

To advise the Shire of Harvey on all strategic and policy matters relating to the heritage of the district.

Objectives of the Group

To advise the Shire of Harvey on all strategic and policy matters relating to the heritage of the district.

To advise the Shire of Harvey about strategies and actions to promote and celebrate cultural heritage awareness.

To advise the Shire of Harvey about the annual review of the Shire's Municipal Inventory (MI).

To identify places of cultural heritage significance that may be added to the MI.

To identify places on the MI for inclusion on the adopted Heritage List under Part 3 – Heritage Protection of Schedule 2 Deemed Provisions of District Planning Scheme No. 1.

To advise the Shire of Harvey on the review of the Local Planning Framework regarding heritage matters.

To advise the Shire of Harvey on the review of the Local Planning Policies regarding heritage matters.

To advise the Shire of Harvey on the development and implementation of incentive schemes for owners of properties listed on the MI.

To advise the Shire of Harvey on the selection process for Heritage Consultants as required.

To assist the Shire of Harvey with the assessment of cultural heritage impacts of development applications as required.

To invite guests to the Advisory Group meetings as required.

- Two representatives from the Noongar community that hold cultural authority.
- Four community representatives.
