Endlessly fascinated
by how world works

Charles Oxnard

Scientist, educator and university administrator
Born: Auton Stile, England, 1933
Died: Perth, aged 91

Charles Oxnard was a scientist, educator and researcher specialising in anatomy and biological anthropology. In addition, he had the soft skills required to excel as a university administrator and as a mentor to graduate students.

During a career spanning more than 40 years, he and his family moved from the UK to Chicago to Los Angeles to Perth.

Charles Ernest Oxnard spent his early childhood years in a small village near Durham in north-east England. In 1937 his father was recruited by the Vickers Supermarine aircraft firm, and the family moved to Southampton.

In 1940, during World War II, the family moved to Scotland, where Charles' father led a team recovering and repairing downed Spitfires. Charles recalled American soldiers practising assault landings on local beaches in early 1944, in preparation for D-Day.

After the war, the family returned to the Durham area. Charles had developed an intense interest in science. He took to dissecting insects, and conducting simple experiments.

In 1952 Charles applied to the medical school of Birmingham University. As an undergraduate student, he spent long hours in the medical library, where he met librarian Eleanor Arthur. They began dating, love blossomed, and in February 1959 they married. In 1960 their first son, Hugh, was born, followed by another son, Guy, in 1961.

While studying medicine, Charles also trained in anatomy. His mentor was anatomist Solly Zuckerman, whose work with primates was both renowned and controversial. Zuckerman's role as scientific adviser to the British government was invaluable, as was his guidance to Charles' career. They continued to correspond until Zuckerman's death in 1993.

Charles thrived under Zuckerman's tutelage, obtaining his bachelor of medicine, a BSc in biological sciences and a bachelor of surgery. Upon graduation, he was offered a position as a researcher in 1959, while working towards his PhD in medicine, awarded in 1962.

One day, Charles heard about a fire raging in a big pet shop. He stopped by to find that a large number of primates had suffocated and their carcasses were to be cremated. He purchased the carcasses on the spot, for £100 cash, which led to

years of useful anatomical research and training for himself and students.

In the late 1960s Sir Solly Zuckerman retired, and Charles looked for an opportunity overseas. While at a conference at University of California, Davis, he was offered a position at the University of Chicago as a professor and researcher in anatomy and biology. His role later expanded to include college dean. Charles and Eleanor loved Chicago, and thrived in the university environment.

In 1978, with a restructuring of his faculty imminent and seeking further challenges, Charles accepted the position of professor of anatomy and biology at the University of Southern California in Los Angeles. With his dean's experience from Chicago, he was also made dean of the graduate school. Charles and Eleanor again thrived in the university environment, and made many lifelong friends.

A colleague prompted Charles to apply for the University of Western Australia's professorship and chair in anatomy and human biology, and he was hired in 1987. The move was a big change from LA, but he, Eleanor and Guy eventually settled in to enjoy the Perth lifestyle (Hugh stayed in the US).

Charles authored and edited numerous scientific papers, books and book chapters. He retired in 1997 and became an emeritus professor, continuing to give lectures, attend seminars, advise graduate students, and do research. In 2001 he was awarded the Charles R. Darwin lifetime achievement award by what was then known as the

American Association of Physical Anthropologists in recognition of his extraordinary scientific career, in which he put his "unique stamp" on nearly every aspect of biological anthropology. In 2008 he received the UWA Chancellor's Medal.

He and Eleanor sold their home after retiring, and became apartment dwellers, eventually settling in Claremont. In 2024 they moved into Aegis Alfred Carson, where Charles passed away peacefully this year while in respite care. He is survived by Eleanor, Hugh and Guy, and their families.

Charles' contribution to science was in both approach and scope. He was early to recognise and implement form and function over rote memorisation in the teaching of anatomy to medical students. He employed quantitative approaches to understanding the evolution of primate anatomy, including that of humans. His work also spanned the role of minerals and vitamins in physical growth, and primate conservation. Charles was always asking questions and was always available to students and colleagues who had questions. He thought broadly and was unafraid of sometimes being wrong — as is every good scientist.

A quote from Dr Matt Cartmill of Duke University, a former graduate student of Charles', summarises the respect his colleagues had for him: "he has given us nothing so rich and valuable as the example he has set us of a lasting, unshakable, disinterested joy in trying to figure out how the world works".

Hawks launch flag tilt

Deanmill claimed the first place in the Lower South West Football League's grand final on the back of a remarkable second-half turnaround in Sunday's qualifying final, getting over the top of Kojonup by nine points at Rea Park.

The Hawks found themselves 23 points adrift of the Cougars at half-time but kicked nine of the next 11 goals after the main break, opening up a buffer which held firm despite conceding the game's final three majors to run out 14.10 (94) to 13.7 (85) winners.

Deanmill will now have another weekend off before the season decider, which will be played at Manjimup Recreation Ground on September 13.

Meanwhile, what was just a second loss of 2025 for the minor premiers means they will need to overcome Southerners in Sunday's preliminary final at Pemberton Oval to ensure they advance to the last game of the season for the third year running.

The competition's leading goalkicker Jordan Strahan slotted another eight majors for the winners, including five inside a 10-minute third-term blitz which saw his side's deficit on the scoreboard quickly turn into an advantage.

At the other end of the ground, Kester Decke was impassable for the Hawks, while Sparks brothers Harley and Cooper dominated through the middle of the ground.

After Deanmill started the second half in perfect fashion through an Ethan Dimitriou (two goals) major inside the first minute, Strahan was able to convert three set shots — two from near the 50-metre arc either side of a finish from an

acute angle — to see his side hit the front. Kojonup were able to immediately muster their first goal of the half through Clancy Tonkin capitalising on a high contact free kick, but Strahan quickly claimed another strong inside-50 pack mark and again made no mistake in front of goal.

After Strahan capped off his brilliant third quarter by adding another to give the Hawks an eight-point lead at the final break, the Cougars managed to strike first in the last term through Lachlan O'Shea, but Deanmill responded with the next three goals through Dimitriou, Blake Rawson and Strahan.

An effort from Kojonup's Josh Crook from beyond the 50-metre arc, which skidded through an unattended goal-square cut Kojonup's deficit back to 14 points as the clock ticked into time-on, but Strahan quickly capitalised on a brilliant Jared Edgar smother to snap a goal which all but sealed the result.

After a frustrating quarter where they had failed to capitalise on their opportunities, the Cougars' efforts were finally rewarded with the game's final three goals but they came too late to seriously worry the winners.

Kojonup had opened up their lead at the main break by kicking four of the last five goals of the first half, the last two of which came from the forward craft of Harry Taylor (four goals).

Glory return to Hay Park

Soccer fans in the South West will have another chance to see Bunbury-raised star Josh Risdon in action when Perth Glory return to the region for another pre-season fixture later this month.

Glory announced on Thursday they would take on Melbourne Victory at Bunbury's Hay Park on Wednesday, September 24 in what will be the second game of a pre-season series, coming after the sides clash at Mandurah's Peelwood Reserve on the preceding Sunday.

Glory's preparations for the A-League Men's season

have included a friendly at Hay Park in each of the last two years, beating Victory 3-1 in 2023 before a 3-2 defeat to Newcastle Jets last year.

After coming up through Bunbury United, Risdon spent his first seven seasons at A-League Men's level with Glory but departed to join Western Sydney Wanderers in 2017.

He spent two years with the Wanderers before departing to join newly-established Western United as a foundation player and captained the club to a championship in 2022 before returning home ahead of last season.

Risdon played 14 games for the Socceroos, includ-

ing three at the 2018 World Cup. At the Bunbury Geographic Sports Awards earlier this year, Risdon said his early days spent at Hay Park still represented some of his fondest memories in the sport.

"Every Friday night after the league team would train, we would have some pasta nights — they were called family nights, everyone would get together and have a meal... all the volunteers would be in the kitchen whipping up a feast for everyone," he said.

"I think that's where the love of the sport came for me, just enjoying playing soccer with my friends, with my brothers, every weekend." Chief executive Anthony Radich said the club was delighted to be heading back to Bunbury.

"These pre-season regional trips have become a hugely enjoyable annual tradition and represent a key part of our commitment to connect with local communities right across the State," he said. "We truly appreciate the continued support and strong bond that we have forged with the City of Bunbury."
